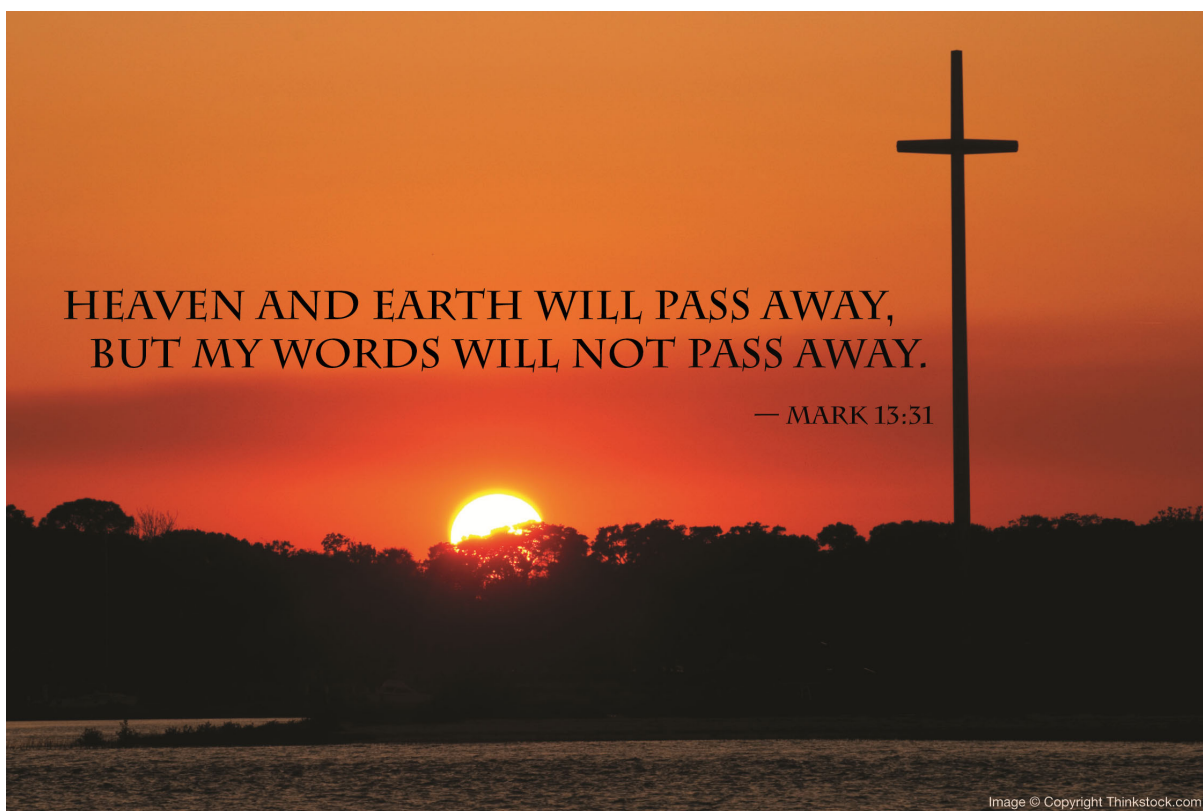

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Eastern Christians developed very different traditions for confessing sin. They see the priest as a witness to God's action, a physician, if you will, rather than a judge. A person confesses sin to God while standing in front of an icon of Jesus, face to face. Without a grill, in the full light of day, near a table with an open Gospel book, the penitent asks the Lord for mercy. A priest standing to the side might offer counsel and confirm God's gift of forgiveness. Rather than list sins and offenses, an Eastern Christian is more likely to speak of a disposition of heart toward God and neighbor, and the desire to forgive those who have wronged them.

Remarkably, although only a priest can pronounce the prayers of forgiveness, lay people, including married men and women, single Christians, monks, and nuns, may witness the confession. This is akin to the ancient Celtic practice of a "soul friend" as a spiritual mentor. Bishops may bless anyone with sufficient theological knowledge and discretion to do this. Eastern Catholics in the United States have largely drifted away from this tradition and toward Latin Rite customs such as confessional screens, set formulas and prayers, and penances. Today, in the interest of preserving the authentic tradition of the Eastern Church, there is a move to restore the older form.

The National Black Sisters' Conference: Answering the call to serve

The National Black Sisters' Conference was the conception of Sister Martin de Porres Grey, RSM. With the idea of instituting a Conference of Vowed Religious women in mind, she attended the first National Black Catholic Clergy Caucus (NBCCC) and shortly after founded the NBSC because she saw a demand "for black religious to address themselves to the urgent need for the Catholic Church in America to develop greater relevancy for black people". Sister Martin de Porres realized that the loss of Black Catholics would compromise the credibility of the Catholic Church as a unified Christian church. Sister Callista remarked that the events taking place in the U.S. during the early sixties necessitated a response from the Black Catholic community. This response explains the formation of both the National Black Catholic Clergy Caucus and the National Black Sisters' Conference within the same year.

The first meeting of the Black Catholic Women Religious was held in the summer of 1968. Among the attendees was Sister Callista Robinson, and in an interview she gave with Dan Stockman in the June 2015 *Global Sisters Report*, she proudly states that she is considered a founding member because she attended the meeting...and hasn't missed one since!

It is important to Sister Callista that National Black Catholic Congress constituents understand that throughout the past 47 years and into the next fifty, the NBSC has been and will continue to be involved in parishes and schools. "in addition to undertaking other social work, we are not neglecting our parishes. We have parishes and schools closing, and we are working to ensure that education and parish life remain viable and accessible to Black Catholics."

When asked how the NBSC has changed since its inception, Sr. Callista replied that the organization itself has not changed, however the issues that the Conference addresses today are different to some extent. Although the group has always responded to concerns regarding the economic and educational status of African American Catholics and continues ministering in these areas, it is the social issues that seem to have grown in prominence since 1968. Sr. Callista specifically referred to the incidents in Ferguson, Missouri, New York City, New York and Charleston, SC, saying that "racism is at the core of these incidents—we have to keep talking about it and how it impacts African Americans."

As she spoke of the tragic events that occurred on June 17, 2015 in SC, Sr. Callista's voice became increasingly somber. She explained that the NBSC, the NBCCC, and the NABCD issued a letter to the people of Charleston, offering prayers for the nine parishioners and their families, as well as the "members of Emanuel AME Church." The letter continued, "This tragedy is made all the more disturbing as it happened during a time while people were praying and rejoicing in their relationship with the Lord. But it is exactly that faith that we need to call upon at this time. While our faith assures us that God will take care for those whose lives were taken, it also motivates the rest of us to do what we can to bring these types of tragedies to an end."

Sister Callista shared how the NBSC works to facilitate social change. After issuing a position statement identifying remediations that must occur, it becomes the work of its members to implement these points of change. In the case of Ferguson, the identified need was for Law Enforcement Agencies to train their officers to counter racist practices and racial profiling. It then became the work of the individual members to enact this change. Members who are college professors, directors of black catholic ministry offices, directors of women's centers, etc.—women dedicated to enacting social change through legislation and public education.

This group of well-educated and dedicated women has embraced the words of Pope Leo XIII to Katherine Drexel, "What are you going to do?" These women act upon them every day by educating and proposing legislation against mass incarceration, authoritarian violence against unarmed Black men, while never forgetting that they must also meet the needs of Black Catholic families by providing places of worship and educational facilities. Perhaps, as Pope Francis so recently did, they should be asking, "What about you? What are you going to do?"

TRADICIONES DE NUESTRA FE

Según el calendario Azteca, las profecías de Nostradamus y el pronóstico de una súper computadora, el mundo que conocemos que debía haber terminado el 21 de diciembre de 2012. 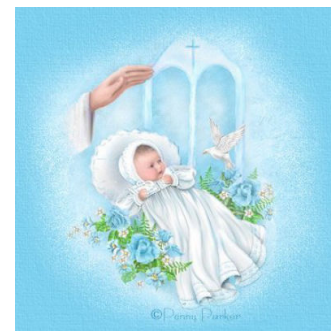
